Dear Mr Speaker

I hereby present a report on the operation of the Freedom of Information Act 1992 as required by section 108 of the Act to be laid on the table of the Legislative Assembly each year.

The enactment of Freedom of Information legislation has been one of this Gövernment's proudest reforms. It represents a major milestone bringing Queensland into line with the norms expected in a modern democratic society and a significant step toward recovery from the political malaise identified by the Fitzgerald Commission.

The Act came into effect on 19 November 1992 for all Ministers and most State agencies, and on 19 May 1993 for local government authorities and Aboriginal and Islander councils. It is pleasing to see in this short time so many members of the Queensland community have made full use of the rights to access official information conferred by the Act. The 4,783 applications made to State public sector agencies during the seven months covered by this report compares with 2,368 made to New South Wales agencies in the first twelve months of its Act. This extraordinary success is due in substantial part to the low cost of applications under the Act. The majority of applications have been for documents related to the applicant's personal affairs: there is no charge for access to this information.

Exposure to scrutiny has also had healthy effects on public sector administration. Agencies have, in many cases for the first time, codified and made available their administrative procedures and policies. Much information, gathered and stored at taxpayers expense, which was formerly kept secret is now routinely published or made available.

Any significant change to the philosophy and practice of public administration can be expected to encounter problems and resistance in its early phases. Moreover any new piece of legislation which has to be interpreted and used by hundreds of administrative decision makers across the public sector will need some time to settle in. Indeed, what we are currently experiencing is the very healthy development of Queensland administrative case law. The spirit of FOI, as exemplified by the overwhelming response rate, is however the clearest possible indication of a bright future for FOI and open government in this State.

### **Executive Summary**

- Chapter 1: Background to FOI examines the political, social and administrative issues which led to the passage of the FOI Act. The various inquiries and the options they generated are analysed and key events recorded.
- Chapter 2: Freedom of Information and Administrative Law Division describes the work of the unit responsible for central co-ordination of FOI activity in the State. In so doing, the Chapter maps the key FOI implementation tasks and describes the construction of networks and FOI training within the Queensland public sector.
- Chapter 3: Role of the Information Commissioner looks at the objectives of this important office and summarises key decisions made during the year.
- Chapter 4: FOI a comparative analysis undertakes a comparative analysis of FOI in Queensland and in other jurisdictions, examining points of similarity and divergence in the various legislative and administrative regimes.
- Chapter 5: FOI and its users looks at public acceptance and use of the legislation.

  Analysis of statistical data reveals patterns of use.

  Examples of information provided under FOI are provided as illustration.
- Chapter 6: Impact on the public sector shows how FOI has altered public sector administration; points to changes in administrative culture attendant on FOI; and considers the costs of implementation and administration.
- Chapter 7: Operational difficulties discusses the problems identified by agencies in undertaking the various activities required by the legislation and the administrative structures put in place to implement the Act.
- Chapter 8: Difficulties in administration of the Act outlines problems encountered by agencies in interpretation of provisions and in compliance with various requirements in the Act.
- Chapter 9: Local government examines the brief experience of local government authorities in administration of the Act. Comments received from one local authority are summarised.

## 1: Background to Freedom of Information

...in an atmosphere of secrecy or inadequate information, corruption flourishes. Wherever secrecy exists, there will be people who are prepared to manipulate it.<sup>1</sup>

In Australia FOI has been adapted from the models pioneered in the United States of America during the 1960s, where legislation was forced on governments by public interest advocates such as Ralph Nader. In Australia, Westminster traditions insisted on the secrecy of the 'counsels of the Crown'. Nonetheless, the passage of the Freedom of Information Act 1982 (Commonwealth) saw Australia become the first Westminster system to embrace the concept.

Legislation was introduced in the Commonwealth and Victoria in the early 1980s with bipartisan support. When governments have had the courage to introduce such legislation, bipartisan support is the norm: FOI is a policy convenient for opposition parties but often inexpedient for governments. It is not without significance that other States, including Queensland, should have had their bodies politic racked with allegations of official corruption and mismanagement before proceeding to introduce FOI legislation.

The Commission of Inquiry known as the Fitzgerald Commission, which operated from 1987–1989, found that the Queensland Government, its public service and its law enforcement agencies, were imbued with a culture inimical to the public interest in open debate and democratic decision-making. Facts inconvenient to the Government of the day, or indeed to the personal interests of some of its members and advisers, were kept away from public gaze. In some instances corrupt individuals escaped detection, exposure and punishment for years. In others, dubious decision-making methods and conflicts of interest remained hidden.

Commissioner Fitzgerald found that the whole Queensland State apparatus was tainted by the climate of secrecy, and that in the absence of effective information about the processes of public administration there was in practical terms no accountability. Political and administrative power can operate arbitrarily or be misused where it 'ceases to be moderated by concern for public opinion'. Moreover '[t]he ultimate check on public administration is public opinion, which can only be truly effective if there are structures and systems designed to ensure that it is properly informed.'2

Fitzgerald accordingly recommended that 'the need for Freedom of Information legislation' be one of the references for the proposed Electoral and Administrative Review Commission (EARC). When in due course EARC was established by the *Electoral and Administrative Review Commission Act 1989*, the FOI reference was adopted as a 'foundational matter' and so was among the first inquiries of the new body.

In December 1989 a new Government was elected with FOI as a plank of its election platform.<sup>3</sup> Wayne Goss's policy speech for the 1989 election

promised to introduce FOI legislation.<sup>4</sup> In the context of pre-election commitments made to allow the Fitzgerald reform agenda to take its course, however, the incoming Goss Government decided to await EARC's findings.

EARC released an Issues Paper (no. 3) in early 1990 which attracted a good deal of public interest. A total of 125 submissions was received by the Commission in response to the Paper, with further verbal input being received at public seminars sponsored by EARC. Among those forwarding written submissions were State Government departments, newspapers, local authorities, political parties, historians, medical colleges, religious groups, educational institutions and their representative bodies, education staff and student representatives, librarians, archivists, Government business enterprises, professional associations and members of the general public.<sup>5</sup>

The EARC report on this reference was released in December 1990, and included a draft Freedom of Information Bill which formed the basis for the present legislation, and which was derived in large part from the models laid down in the *Freedom of Information Act 1982* (Commonwealth) and the *Freedom of Information Act 1983* (Victoria), but which also borrowed freely from legislation in other jurisdictions and incorporated some original features.

As per the procedure recommended in the Fitzgerald Report, the Parliamentary Committee on Electoral and Administrative Review (PCEAR) was then commissioned to make further inquiries and present a second report on the reference, based on EARC's work. All political parties represented in the Queensland Legislative Assembly were represented on this committee. PCEAR in turn sought public submissions and received some seventeen, about half from persons and organisations who had already submitted to EARC, and about half from new sources. Members of PCEAR also conducted a tour of Australia and New Zealand to confer with administrators and legal officers in other jurisdictions where FOI legislation was already in operation.

PCEAR presented its report in April 1991, agreeing in general with EARC's recommendations and draft legislation. Several of the submissions made to PCEAR requested extension of exemptions and removal of public interest riders on exemption clauses. PCEAR rejected such submissions, and produced a unanimous report recommending the adoption of legislation along the lines suggested by EARC.

Key points of difference, however, were PCEAR's insistence that the power to issue 'conclusive certificates of exemption' be given to the Attorney-General rather than the Premier; and PCEAR's belief that the legislation not apply to the Legislative Assembly or documents in the possession of Royal Commissions or Commissions of Inquiry.

The Government, in its consideration of the two reports, was concerned

to ensure widespread community and in-service consultation in the drafting and passage of legislation.

The Freedom of Information Bill 1991, introduced into the Legislative Assembly in October 1991 closely followed the model suggested by EARC and incorporated most amendments to that document suggested by PCEAR. A notable inclusion from the PCEAR report was the inclusion of a section (s.4) stating that the object of the Act 'is to extend as far as possible the right of the community to have access to information held by Queensland government.'

The Bill lay on the table of Parliament for some time in order for its details to be widely understood by Members and the public, for consultation with interested organisations, for adequate debate to ensue, and to allow time for those who would be administering the legislation to be trained on its implementation. Certain key and original features of the legislation received considerable attention in debate on the Bill, notably the unlimited retrospectivity of application, and the creation of the office of Information Commissioner as sole avenue of appeal from most decisions under the Act.

To summarise the debate, some Members voiced their concerns that exclusions and provisions for the imposition of fees and charges in the legislation would be used to deny the rights of access which were the object of the Bill.<sup>6</sup> Other Members referred to the history of official secrecy in Queensland and the comprehensive investigation and consultation processes which had produced the legislation, and voiced optimism over how the Act would be administered.

The Government had publicly committed itself to the passage of the legislation during the life of the Parliament, although a number of amendments suggested during the consultation process were accepted. Accordingly the amended Bill was passed on 5 August 1992 and received Royal Assent on 19 August 1992. Parts 1 and 2 of the Act came into force on that date and Parts 3 and 4 three months later on 19 November 1992 for all agencies except local government authorities and Aboriginal and Islander Councils. For these agencies Parts 1 and 2 of the Act came into force on 19 February 1993 and Parts 3 and 4 on 19 May 1993.

### 2: Freedom of Information and

### Administrative Law Division

The Freedom of Information and Administrative Law Division (FOIALD) was established within the then Attorney-General's Department in October 1991, prior to the passage of key administrative law reform legislation. It will be recalled, however, that the EARC report was published in April 1991. Among its recommendations was

The Commission recommends that:

- (a) the Attorney-General's Department administer FO' legislation and the Attorney-General's Department should be given sufficient resources to carry out the role effectively;
- (b) an FOI Unit for the implementation and administration of FOI be established forthwith;
- (c) government ensure that agencies have sufficient resources and staff so as to enable them to meet their obligations under FOI legislation; and
- (d) a review of the operation of FOI legislation be undertaken two years after its commencement by the Parliamentary Committee for Electoral and Administrative Review.

The key role of the Division is to monitor, analyse and review all implemented and proposed administrative law reforms. FOIALD activities in relation to FOI have been in four main areas: legislative impact assessment and administrative systems design, training provision and information dissemination for State agencies and the public, data collection on FOI implementation, and answering public and official inquiries.

#### Legislative impact assessment and administrative systems design

FOIALD is represented on the Inter-Departmental Committee on Administrative Law Reform established at the end of 1991 to co-ordinate key agency views on legislation and implementation of reforms.

The Freedom of Information Policy and Procedures Manual was produced by FOIALD in November 1992, prior to the Act coming into force. A special local government edition was also prepared (in collaboration with the Local Government Association of Queensland Inc.) in March 1993, prior to the Act's date of commencement for local government. These manuals are used by staff processing applications for access and review under the Act and by persons authorised under the Act to make decisions. The Manuals' contents cover such matters as:

- Definitions;
- Publication of certain documents and information;
- Access to documents;
- Exemptions; and
- Review.

The manuals also include pro-forma letters to guide officers in matters which should be covered in correspondence with applicants and in designing forms to be used by applicants. Copies of the Manual are available to the public under the Act. It is intended future editions will be made available for purchase from GOPRINT retail outlets.

#### Training and information dissemination

FOIALD's primary focus through the year was on training and building networks of practitioners. The Division conducted numerous training activities for practitioners and interested officers from Departments, Ministers' offices and local government authorities during the year. Table 2.1 lists the training courses provided by the Division during the year. Most courses had an average of twenty participants.

The Division facilitated regular FOI practitioners' forums, seminars and workshops to allow practitioners to form networks and exchange information on their activities. Guest speakers and participants have included staff of the Information Commissioner, media representatives, and practitioners from other jurisdictions. Training courses were held throughout the State, including Cairns, Townsville, Mackay, Rockhampton, Bundaberg, Gladstone, Toowoomba and Mt Isa.

In addition, Information Kits were produced for interested officers, public administration and administrative law professionals and members of the public including such materials as:

- transcripts and extracts of relevant policy statements (eg. speeches by Government Ministers);
- articles by legal and administration analysts;
- analysis of experience in other jurisdictions; and
- · copies of the Bill (and Act when passed and assented to).

Posters advertising the availability of information under FOI were distributed free of charge to all agencies and to other likely outlets such as MLAs' offices and legal service offices. 1600 posters were printed and

distributed. The advice that these posters be displayed at counters and offices frequented by the public (such as hospital waiting rooms, police stations, licence issuing centres, and State welfare agencies) appears from agency reports to have been widely heeded.

FOI information pamphlets What is Freedom of Information? were prepared by FOIALD and similarly distributed. The pamphlets canvass definitions, rights, procedures for application and review, fees and charges, consultation provisions, and amendment of documents. 250 000 pamphlets were printed and distributed in two batches over the year, the second batch due to agency demand.

#### Data collection

FOIALD is charged with the task of monitoring and reviewing the impact of administrative law reform in the Queensland public sector. Establishment and maintenance of data collection and performance monitoring systems therefore assume a high priority among the Division's activities.

The collection of data on the operation of the FOI Act is further impelled by the reporting requirements imposed by section 108, and by the perceived need to supply data for the planned two-year review of the legislation.

To assist agencies with their data recording and statistical reporting responsibilities, FOIALD engaged consultants to write a PC-based software package for use by agencies and FOIALD centrally. FOIDERS (Freedom of Information Data Entry and Recording System) was released to agencies for user trials in January 1993.8 Development of the package proceded throughout the year and continues.

Subsequent upgraded production releases have responded to user comments on earlier versions and have introduced more flexible reporting facilities as well as improved interractivity. As well as its data recording functions, FOIDERS operates as a checklist and critical deadline reminder system for agencies to prompt them in compliance with the Act's numerous processing time requirements.

Agencies using FOIDERS submit their data on magnetic media which is simply down-loaded onto the central database. Where agencies, such as departmental central offices, act as reporting co-ordinators for portfolio agencies, they are able to compile data for their portfolios prior to dispatch of the portfolio report to FOIALD.

Prior to the introduction of FOIDERS, FOIALD developed and released a manual (paper-based) data recording system for FOI applications. Some agencies continue to use the manual system, particularly agencies handling small numbers of applications. Manual system forms, when submitted, are entered on the central database by FOIALD staff.

#### Answering public and official inquiries

As the central body with responsibility for FOI, FOIALD has fielded numerous inquiries from members of the public and officers of agencies about their rights and responsibilities under the legislation. It is difficult to quantify the average number of calls received, as inquiries have had intense peaks at around the time of the legislation's dates of effect, when decisions of the Information Commissioner are brought down, around training activities and so on. At times during the year answering inquiries occupied some FOIALD officers full-time.

In descending order of frequency, inquiries have been in the following broad categories:

- 'first point of call' inquiries from the public callers want
  information about how to gain access to records and need
  information about which agency to contact, whom to contact within
  an agency, and so forth;
- interpretational and procedural inquiries from officers of agencies needing assistance with processing applications;
- inquiries from members of the public seeking further information about their applications confirmation that proper procedures have been followed by the agency with whom they have been dealing, information on review procedures, and queries concerning the independence of internal reviewers;
- 'privacy' inquiries from members of the public concerned that another person, such as an estranged spouse, could gain access to information about them under the FOI Act;
- mistaken inquiries from members of the public requiring information either publicly available elsewhere or outside the jurisdiction of the Act. Examples include inquiries about forthcoming events, credit rating information, Commonwealth Government information, information held by solicitors and private medical practitioners, library information, bank account information, private school and hospital information, court listings and so forth;
- inquiries from students required to research assignments on the operation of the Act or on interpretation of the Act.

FOIALD has a '008' telephone number to assist people living outside Brisbane with their inquiries. This number was advertised on the posters and in the pamphlets distributed by the Division. It is also listed in all Queensland telephone directories and has been widely used by members of the community outside Brisbane.

### 3: Role of the Information Commissioner

Part 5 of the FOI Act created the office of Information Commissioner, specifying (section 61(2)) that the Parliamentary Commissioner for Administrative Investigations (Ombudsman) was also to be the Information Commissioner. The Information Commissioner has therefore been the Parliamentary Commissioner, Mr Fred Albietz. Section 90 of the Act also allows the Information Commissioner to delegate all or any of the powers conferred by the Act on another member of the Commissioner's staff.

The Information Commissioner is empowered by section 71(1) to investigate and review specified decisions of agencies and Ministers made under the Act. This power effectively allows the Commissioner to conduct a complete review of the merits of the decision, and a formal determination of the Commissioner in effect substitutes for the decision of the agency or Minister which was under review. Because decisions of the Information Commissioner are in effect conclusive determinations, the office of Information Commissioner fulfils the role of a specialist tribunal like the Commonwealth Administrative Appeals Tribunal in respect of the FOI Act.

The mission statement authorised for the office by the Commissioner is:

to provide a specialised and expert dispute resolution service (affording independent review in respect of those categories of decisions specified in s.71 of the FOI Act) that is speedier, cheaper for the participants, more informal and more user-friendly than the court system, or tribunals which follow courtlike procedure.

Because applications for access under the Act could only be made from 19 November 1992 (and for local government from 19 May 1993), external appeal applications began to arrive only from mid-January 1993. Nonetheless, by 30 June some 120 applications for external review had been received. Of these, twenty-seven had been resolved.

In most cases, resolution was effected by negotiation with the parties leading to withdrawal of the application either because the applicant became aware that the application was misconceived; was beyond the power of the Commissioner to resolve; related to a deemed refusal to grant access because of time passing but on which the agency had now made a decision; or because of discovery of new information by the agency. The Information Commissioner made three significant formal decisions on external review applications from the twenty-seven resolved in the course of the year to 30 June 1993. Two of these decisions are briefly summarised below.

The high rate of resolution by consultation and mediation is a desirable outcome, indicating cost minimisation for applicants and agencies. It was envisaged in the original EARC recommendations on external review mechanisms that recourse to an Information Commissioner – rather than a formal judicial tribunal on the Commonwealth and Victorian models –

would yield resource savings, reduce legalism, and would be less timeconsuming. The first two objectives would appear to have been met. It remains to be seen if the time taken to process external review cases is less in the Queensland model than in formal judicial systems.

The Information Commissioner's comments in regard to confidentiality of Cabinet material have been under consideration by Government. There is a need to balance the competing interests of improved decision-making through open consultation processes and the requirement that under the Westminster system of collective and individual Ministerial responsibility Cabinet papers are confidential. The Information Commissioner's decision to disregard certain Commonwealth precedents has created a certain amount of uncertainty which may need to be addressed through further legislative clarification.

#### Eccleston and Department of Family Services and Aboriginal and Islander Affairs

This decision, delivered on 30 June 1993, has generated considerable debate and concerned an application by Roy Eccleston, bureau chief of *The Australian* newspaper, to the Department of Family Services and Aboriginal and Islander Affairs for 'assessments or advice which were provided within Queensland Government and those requested by the Queensland Government ... of the consequences for the Queensland Government of the recent decision of the High Court in the *Mabo* case.' In the course of the case, the applicant and the Department agreed not to press certain exemptions and claims. The decision therefore relates to seven documents comprising some twenty-six pages which the Department claimed were exempt under section 41 of the Act (Matter relating to deliberative process).

The matter turned on the public interest test contained in section 41. Unlike other public interest tests in the Act, this test is a negative, placing the onus on the decision maker to demonstrate harm to the public interest arising from release of the information sought. Matter is exempt under this section 'if its disclosure...[meets certain criteria] and would, on balance, be contrary to the public interest.' The Commissioner drew on Commonwealth precedents, and various definitions of 'public interest' and democratic rights and freedoms derived from legal precedents and other sources. In so doing, he commented that in certain cases the public interest in openness and accountability might be in conflict with and outweigh the public interest in efficient and effective use of limited government resources. These tensions, he went on to say, would be most apparent in decisions made under section 41 of the Act.

To summarise, the Department argued that the public interest would not be served by release of material which comprised confidential policy consultations between agencies. Such documents often express views which are not the final views of government, but which must be frank and hence confidential if government is to be properly advised. It was further argued that the premature disclosure of such material would cause public confusion at a sensitive time, and that the legal issues being canvassed in the material were complex and not widely understood. The applicant argued it was difficult to conceive of a matter of greater public interest and importance than *Mabo*, and that the public was more mature than the Department believed and was capable of making more rational judgments when presented with accurate information.

The Information Commissioner found that the Department had failed to make a case that disclosure would damage the public interest. Moreover, nothing had been adduced which would outweigh the public interest in favour of disclosure. He found that the legal precedents set forth by the Department were faulty in terms of the Queensland Act. He found that claims based on the notion that 'frankness and candour' would be inhibited by disclosure should be rejected unless founded on a particular factual basis. If the likelihood of disclosure would inhibit the use of unnecessarily brusque, colourful or defamatory language, then the public interest would not suffer as a result. The argument advanced by the Department that disclosure would confuse the public was, according to the Commissioner, based on 'rather elitist and paternalistic assumptions' and that the public should be able to judge itself whether information was too confusing to be of benefit or whether debate was necessary.

Although none of the documents in question was the subject of Cabinet discussions, nor was any even a communication between Ministers, because the Department had made public interest claims reflecting on the policy process the Commissioner made some remarks about the extent to which section 36 (Cabinet matter) ought to be applied. Making reference to the *Queensland Cabinet Handbook*, he found that consultation with interested persons and organisations is an important part of the process of developing a proposal for consideration by Cabinet. This process would be likely to produce better outcomes, in his view, if assumptions on which a proposal is based have been exposed to the scrutiny of interested parties. He also found that the checks and balances in the Cabinet process foreclosed the possibility that agencies would refuse to consult because of the possibility of disclosure.

The Commissioner ruled that the applicant was entitled to access to all the contested documents other than information identified by the Commissioner as being exempt under section 36(1)(d).

#### Smith and the Administrative Services Department

In this case, Colin Graham Smith had applied for access to all communications between the Department and any Minister concerning himself, and for all communications to and from Crown Law concerning himself. The Department's decision had released some documents and exempted one document under section 43 (Legal professional privilege). The applicant appealed to the Information Commissioner on the basis

that the Department had not adequately searched for documents in the terms of his request.

The Commissioner found that he did have jurisdiction to hear an appeal on this ground, and wrote to the Department asking it to undertake a further search. A more thorough search revealed another document, which the Department also argued was exempt under section 43.

The Commissioner then examined the Department's exemption claims and found in the Department's favour: the documents concerned had been brought into being for the sole purpose of seeking or giving legal advice in the context of a professional relationship of solicitor and client between the Administrative Services Department and the Crown Solicitor's Office as legal adviser. The Commissioner also rejected the applicant's assertions that the Department had been acting illegally, finding that the Department's claim of privilege would not be defeated unless there was some real basis for a charge of illegality or abuse of power: an allegation alone would not be sufficient. The Department had the power to waive its claim of privilege but had not done so.

In making his finding the Commissioner noted that section 43, unlike other exemption clauses, was not subject to a 'public interest' test, and that therefore it was not necessary to balance the public interest in disclosure with the public interest in non-disclosure. Section 43 operated by reference to the character of the documents rather than the effects of their disclosure.

### 4. FOI — a comparative analysis

Queensland's FOI legislation was conceived with a decade of experience in other jurisdictions in mind. Commissioner Fitzgerald's remarks about the corrosive effects of secrecy on public administration were borne in mind by the legislation's designers and drafters when examining the legislative and administrative background in FOI elsewhere.

The Queensland legislation parallels legislation found elsewhere in many key respects.

All Australian legislation creates a legally enforceable right for members of the public to gain access to the information contained in 'documents', these being broadly defined to include almost any item with an information content, such as x-rays, photographs, maps, electronic and magnetic media, labels and so forth. None of the Australian FOI laws presently in effect imposes qualifications such as age, citizenship or mental state on persons who may apply for access to documents.9

All Australian legislation also binds both Ministers and Government agencies. Agencies not bound by the legislation are specifically exempted. The Queensland Act specifically exempts the Governor, Legislative Assembly and its members, the Parliamentary Service Commission, various Government-owned commercial enterprises, various Commissions of Inquiry, and the Litigation Reform Commission. In addition, certain agencies are partially exempt insofar as their functions relate to certain exempt functions. Such agencies are the Health Rights Commissioner in relation to conciliation, court registries as far as their judicial functions are concerned, all agencies as far as certain national security organisation records are concerned, and subsidiaries of the Queensland Treasury Corporation in relation to their commercial activities. Certain parts of the Act also do not apply to the Information Commissioner or documents of the Information Commissioner.

These exemptions for agencies closely parallel the exemptions for documents found elsewhere in the Act. Queensland's legislation thus applies to a wider spectrum of agencies than any other save Tasmania's, where there are no exempt agencies. For example, local government authorities are exempt in Victoria until 1 January 1994, and local government documents other than personal affairs documents are exempt in New South Wales. Parole boards are exempt in South Australia and Western Australia. The Auditors-General of the Commonwealth, New South Wales, South Australia and Western Australia are exempt. Queensland's exemption for Parliament and its members is not, however, found in the Commonwealth and Victorian legislation. The exemption for the Information Commissioner is found also in Western Australia.

In Queensland, as noted in the previous chapter, there is a need for clarification in regard to the availability of certain Cabinet material under the Act.

The unlimited retrospective application of Queensland's legislation is found elsewhere only in Western Australia. Similarly, conclusive determinations on external review applications are to an Information

Commissioner only in Queensland and Western Australia. Other jurisdictions provide for appeals to the Ombudsman and beyond to a court or tribunal.<sup>10</sup>

Complaints in the media, parliaments and from the public in all jurisdictions about the application of FOI tend to focus on three main impediments to persons wishing to gain access to information:

- the time taken to process applications and reviews;
- the application of exemptions to deny access; and
- the cost of lodging and processing applications.

Table 4.1 compares the provisions found in the various FOI laws for time limits on handling applications and reviews. Queensland appears to be around the average for time limits on decision-making and internal reviews.

Table 4.2 compares the exemptions available under the various FOI Acts to deny access to certain matter. It should be noted that the 'public interest' test applying to certain exemptions varies in its wording from within legislation and from jurisdiction to jurisdiction. Some tests require that the release of documents be 'contrary to the public interest' for the exemption to apply (for example, section 41 – Matter relating to deliberative process). The Queensland public interest test in most cases is that material in the specified class is exempt 'unless its disclosure would, on balance, be in the public interest'. In practice, however, and despite misgivings by some commentators at the time of the legislation's introduction, these provisions have been liberally interpreted with the applicant being given the benefit of any doubt.<sup>11</sup>

Table 4.3 compares the fees and charges operating under the various laws. Queensland clearly provides the cheapest access to information. It should be noted that neither application fees nor photocopying charges are imposed on persons seeking personal affairs information. Personal affairs applications account for 75.4 percent of all applications lodged in Queensland.<sup>12</sup>

In no jurisdiction do fees and charges approach full cost recovery, although some – such as the Commonwealth and South Australia - are considerably more expensive than Queensland.

Access to internal and external review is entirely free of charge in Queensland, whereas court and tribunal legal costs are a major consideration in some other jurisdictions. Tasmania, South Australia and Western Australia have adopted a similar external review model to Queensland.

While some jurisdictions have maximum charge limits, under the Queensland legislation an application would need to involve many hundreds of pages of photocopying in order to approach limits which in these other jurisdictions would be reached on much smaller requests. Provisions for waivers in financial hardship and public interest cases in other jurisdictions do not apply in Queensland.

There is good reason to claim, therefore, that Queensland now has the most liberally applied FOI legislation in Australia, and that documents held by Queensland Government agencies, statutory and local authorities are the most genuinely accessible to the public.



### 5. FOI and its users

As noted in Chapter 2, public awareness of FOI was fostered before and immediately after the Act came into effect on 19 November 1992 through the distribution of literature and posters to all agencies for display in public contact areas. Use was also made of the media through a rigorous program of interviews and media releases by Government Ministers, and talks with community organisations throughout the State given by the Minister and FOIALD staff.

The Queensland public made maximal use of the rights conferred by the Act from the moment it came into effect. Chart 5.1 compares the number of applications per month per 100 000 population in each of the State jurisdictions in the first year of operation of FOI legislation. While Queensland is clearly out in front in terms of public usage of FOI, it should be noted that the Act only came into effect for local authorities for the last six weeks of the reporting period, and this data has not entered into calculations. Available evidence from other jurisdictions and data collected since 30 June 1993 suggest that local government applications will considerably increase the number of applications made under the Act in subsequent years.

While it is tempting to ascribe the popularity of FOI applications to the absence of fees and charges on 'personal affairs' applications, the data from other jurisdictions shows a similar proportion of 'personal affairs' to other applications. If fees and charges were the main determining factor, a higher proportion of applications would be expected to be from the free 'personal affairs' category, as Queensland is the only jurisdiction to apply no charge whatsoever for access to these records. In fact, variations among States in the proportion of FOI applications for personal affairs information are not significant. The 75.4 percent personal affairs applications in Queensland compares with 67.4 percent in Victoria (1991–92) and 70 percent in New South Wales (1989-90). Queenslanders appear


to be making greater use of FOI than are the residents of other States, but they are looking for the same sorts of information in the same proportions.

Chart 6.1 shows the top ten agencies by applications, and the numbers of personal and non-personal applications received in the year by each. This pattern is similar to that seen in Victoria, for example, where the Police and the Accident Compensation Commission are the biggest receivers of applications (in reverse order to Queensland). Police top the list again in New South Wales. The proportion of non-personal applications for Police records in Queensland is significantly higher than in other jurisdictions, however, where in New South Wales and Victoria fewer than twenty percent of applications are non-personal. The Queensland Department of Transport non-personal application rate of 87.8 percent is also high in comparison with agencies performing similar functions in other jurisdictions. There is no evidence to suggest that applications to Queensland Transport are of a different kind than those to similar agencies in other jurisdictions. Elsewhere, the pattern appears to reflect experience in other States. The client-service agencies generally report a high proportion of personal applications, while regulatory and coordinating agencies report higher levels of non-personal applications.

Most applicants have received all documents captured by their applications. Chart 5.2 shows the access decisions of all applications processed. 64.9 percent of all applications were granted in full.


Chart 5.2

Analysis of action by document - Chart 5.3 - shows an even higher proportion of documents processed are released in full - 87.6 percent of all documents processed. That is, most applicants get most of the documents they want, most of the time.

The Act's creation of a right to gain access to personal records is perhaps the greatest success of the legislation. Workers' compensation claimants are able to find out how their cases have been handled; patients are able to view their medical records; former wards of State and other Family Services clients are able to find out how decisions which have affected their lives have been reached; people who have been the subject of investigations can discover the evidence amassed against them; prisoners can see what records are held on their cases; employees can see whether material held on file may have affected their careers. In most cases applicants are given access to all material sought, without cost.

Many non-personal applications concern the operation of regulatory agencies on business and property transactions and rights, or allow applicants to gain access to statistical and survey data which has been gathered at taxpayers' expense but which is otherwise not available. The levying of fees and charges in non-personal affairs applications provoked some negative comment from public interest advocacy and community groups, especially conservation groups. These concerns focused on the lack of a ceiling on charges and the lack of a public interest waiver provision as found in some other jurisdictions. The rate of fifty cents per page was also criticised.

Procedural manuals used by regulatory agencies to assess applications and make administrative decisions are routinely available under FOI, enabling failed or prospective applicants to frame their cases in the best possible light.

A small proportion of applications has been made by journalists. The time and resource constraints confronting journalists mean that material unearthed under FOI does not often qualify as news. This has been a source of frustration for some. Jack Waterford is a senior Canberra-based

journalist and pioneer of using FOI as an investigative journalistic tool. He points out that few journalists bother to use FOI, and some of those who do use it badly through ill-focused requests and failure to use the material provided:

If a relatively full disclosure by a public servant or administrator reveals no obvious points of attack, research is most often promptly halted and attention is then focused on some other project. All too often, journalists drop the ball precisely when they have a good story because they have defined the story only in terms of a fairly naive outcome which did not come about.<sup>13</sup>

The role of the media in publicising the availability of FOI has been an invaluable asset in the successful operation of the legislation. This was particularly so in the time leading up to the Act coming into force, when many print and electronic media outlets ran stories and interviews explaining how FOI would work. There is no doubt this coverage greatly assisted with public awareness of the legislation and contributed to the rush of applications from the moment the Act came into force. Similar, although more muted, coverage attended the Act's date of effect for local government and Aboriginal and Islander councils six months later.<sup>14</sup>

Even negative comment on FOI has been useful, both as publicity on the existence of the legislation, and as admonition to administrators to heed the public interest in prompt disclosure.

A central concern of many critical articles has been that Ministers would intervene in FOI decision-making to block release of sensitive material.<sup>15</sup> The Act provides that decisions on applications are made by independent authorised decision-makers. Not one instance was cited of decision-makers being subjected to improper influence to exclude material sought under FOI. Nevertheless, the assumption that decisions to exclude material must be made from political motives was implicitly or explicitly the basis of much of the comment on the Act during the year.

The communications media play a vital role in maintenance of our democratic system, one of which the media themselves are self-consciously aware. FOI offers the media a powerful investigative tool to open government to public scrutiny, to criticise the rationale for decisions rather than simply reporting the fact of decisions being made, to expose incompetence, malice and wrongdoing in public administration. In the hands of a skilled journalist, FOI can expose the thought processes of government; it can fill in the background; it can lay bare underlying assumptions and values.

Every story beginning 'Material revealed under FOI today...' will be a minor victory for the legislation.

Examples abound in the first year of the legislation where non-personal FOI applications have benefited the public. Such examples include:

- environmental and other community action groups have discovered the data on which planning decisions are based, and used this in putting their own cases before relevant authorities;
- potential litigants in breach of contract cases have used FOI to uncover material which enabled them to put their cases together;
- long and intractable grievances with agencies have been cleared up
  when documents accessed under FOI have shown that the agencies
  concerned have operated in good faith and not been involved in
  conspiracies;
- local historians and family history researchers have used FOI to uncover data about their areas of interest;
- strata title unit owners have been able to see objections and submissions made by other unit owners, enabling them to amend proposals to meet the objectors' concerns<sup>16</sup>;
- leaseholders have been able to find out the reasons for decisions made concerning their leases;
- interested parties have been able to gain access to full reports concerning motor vehicle accidents, assisting with litigation and compensation;
- a prospective civil litigant was able to obtain police rosters enabling him to identify possible respondents in a claim for damages in an assault case;
- interested parties and legal representatives have been given access to search warrants, police policy documents, details of complaints and their investigation, police officers' notebooks and operational documents to assist them with their cases.

### 6: Impact on the public sector

The introduction of FOI was expected to require significant attitudinal and cultural change within the public sector. In 1991, at a seminar on FOI, I commented that FOI 'will have a profound effect on our system of public administration, one which will require a significant cultural shift, and one which involves every person working within the public service.' 17

Prior to the passage of the Act, most Departments and some of the larger agencies subject to the Act appointed full-time FOI co-ordinators. Some Departments and agencies not expecting large numbers of applications added these duties to an existing position. In some of the larger Departments, separate administrative units to deal with FOI together with administrative law issues and other administrative reform agenda items were established. In most cases these positions were established close to the corporate centre, either in the Director-General's office or in a Corporate Services division.

The occupants of these positions, their supervisors and other persons likely to hold delegations under the Act formed the main body of attendees at seminars and training activities run by FÓIALD in the period before the Act came into effect. Most Departments and large agencies produced stationery such as application forms and special 'released under FOI' photocopier stationery before the commencement date. Departmental FOI co-ordinators also ensured distribution of literature and procedural manuals to appropriate areas and nominated staff within their organisations.

The resource and administrative impact has not been evenly shared across the public sector. Chart 6.1 shows the number of applications in personal and non-personal categories received by the top ten agencies.

As can be seen, FOI has had differential impact on agencies. Chart 6.2 shows clearly that one agency, namely the Workers' Compensation Board, alone accounts for almost a quarter of all applications received by all agencies.

Chart 6.1 Applications received: top ten agencies





Chart 6.2

Some agencies, such as the Queensland Police Service and the Department of Health, have received both many and complex applications. A low number of applications does not necessarily, however, signify a light FOI case load. Appendix I, 'Response times', and Appendix J, 'Application fees and photocopying charges collected', show that some agencies with low numbers of applications have had to devote significant resources to those applications on account of their complexity. The North Queensland Electricity Board, Criminal Justice Commission and Department of the Premier, Economic and Trade Development are examples.

By contrast the low unit time and cost, and impressive response times, of the Workers' Compensation Board is indicative of relative simplicity of the (almost all personal) applications as well as of administrative efficiency.

#### Benefits of FOI for public administration

In response to FOI requests a number of agencies have altered their administrative procedures to allow routine access to commonly sought documents, either free or for a charge based on the cost of providing the service. A notable example is the Health Department, which introduced an Administrative Access policy in January 1993 for medical records. Under this scheme, patients may gain access to their own records within five working days simply by writing to the superintendent of the relevant hospital. Supervised access to the actual records is provided free and a photocopying service is available, also free, if required. The policy provides faster access for patients and reduces the administrative workload on the Department.

A number of agencies have been influenced by the availability of procedure and policy manuals and guidelines under FOI to codify and collect material which had previously been dispersed on various files or existed only in the memories of long-serving personnel. The Department of Business, Industry and Regional Development, for example, collated its policy and procedure documents into a series of procedure manuals which are available to the public immediately on request, free of charge. This task was largely undertaken by the Department's FOI Co-ordinator. As a result of this exercise, several procedures were rationalised and new systems introduced which have resulted in tangible benefits to Departmental efficiency and effectiveness. Critical activities have been identified and subjected to rigorous analysis and codification. Standardisation of some procedures, such as travel accounting, has meant that operating costs have become more transparent, cost centres are able to be more readily identified and savings may be generated from rationalisation of resource use.

Time deadlines for processing applications imposed by the Act have focused attention of senior management in some agencies on the need to improve records management. Administrative difficulties have been experienced in locating some records. Some agencies have seen changes in Administrative Arrangements lead to an amalgamation of functions under one administrative umbrella. Old record keeping and document control systems may in these instances be retained in the functional area and not be fully integrated into the new body's main system – the Department of Employment, Vocational Education, Training and Industrial Relations is an example. In other cases paper-based records control systems originating in the colonial service co-exist with computer-based local storage systems managed randomly by individual officers.

Increased allocation of resources and intellectual capital to records management, while it may be painful for some agencies in the short term, can only yield long-term productivity benefits. Efficient record retrieval will mean that:

- precedents can be located;
- the history of an agency's dealings with a client can be accessed;
- the wheel does not need to be invented afresh in every case the
  accumulated organisational wisdom gained through past experience
  is available to present officers; and
- agencies will not be defeated in litigation simply because records which support their cases cannot be located.

Many agencies rightly perceived upgrading of records systems to be a priority task. Queensland State Archives has provided advice and training to agencies in records management. The State Archivist was a guest speaker at several of the training courses offered for agency staff by FOIALD during the year.

Some agencies have entered into the spirit of FOI to provide mechanisms allowing release of material which would formerly have been exempt. For example, Department of Lands administers strata title and lease variations, allowing for objections to be taken into account in its decision-making process. When members of the public contact the Department inquiring about procedures to lodge objections, they are sent forms and information materials. From 1 January 1993 the Department placed a written caveat on this correspondence to the effect that objections lodged with the Department could be released under FOI. Since that time, it has been possible for persons about whose proposals objections have been lodged to find out the precise contents of these objections and so amend their proposals accordingly. Formerly the Department was required by section 51 of the FOI Act to consult with third parties and as a result refused access to many of these objections. The Department advises there has been no decline in the number of objections lodged, although now that persons lodging objections are aware that their comments can be made available, less colourful language tends to be used. The Department has realised resource savings in not having to consult on these FOI applications; both FOI and lease variation applications are processed quicker; and applicants are discovering the nature of objections, thereby assisting them in many cases to amend proposals so as to take account of objections.

The requirement in section 18 of the Act for agencies to publish a Statement of Affairs listing kinds of documents publicly available for inspection, purchase or free of charge has also had appreciable side benefits. Many members of the public are reported to be undertaking their own research into regulations administered and services offered, sparing officers from answering trivial and repetitive inquiries on these matters. As a corollary, agencies have been encouraged to publish and make available much material which would otherwise be available under FOI, but without the administrative burden of FOI procedures.

Although the task was not required to be completed until after the end of the 1992–93 reporting year, it was clear that compilation and publication of Statements of Affairs has seen some agencies make their policy and procedure manuals more readily available. Many agencies used the Statement of Affairs exercise to circulate guidelines on policy and procedure preparation, and commenced compilation of procedural manuals. There is little doubt section 19 of the Act, which guarantees public access to such manuals, is a powerful incentive for agencies to undertake this task.

Both the accessibility of documents under FOI and the entitlement to statements of reasons for decisions under the *Judicial Review Act 1991* have made officers aware of the need to ensure that decisions must be adequately supported and seen to be soundly based.

Whereas formerly officers, cofident of confidentiality, may have felt able to dismiss an applicant or client with an offhand comment it is now necessary to provide full and appropriate justification for any decision. While no doubt some officers resent this as restricting candour, a requirement to provide rational justification for administrative action can only benefit the quality of decision-making. This sort of paradigm shift in Queensland public service culture, while difficult to quantify as a cost benefit, is likely to be the greatest contribution of FOI to public administration in this State.

#### Extra efforts by agencies

Some agencies have made noteworthy efforts to assist members of the public with their applications and with access to released material.

The Departments of Health and Family Services, Aboriginal and Islander Affairs have introduced a '008' telephone service to help members of the public living outside Brisbane with their inquiries and assist with applications.

The Departments of Justice and Attorney-General, Education, Family Services, Aboriginal and Islander Affairs, Health, Housing, Local Government and Planning, and Treasury have all set aside special reading rooms for applicants to inspect documents in their central offices.

Most Departments make their libraries available, on a non-loan basis, to members of the public.

Anecdotal evidence also abounds of agencies taking trouble to meet applicants' requirements, such as by making documents available for inspection at regional offices where applicants reside outside Brisbane, and collecting fees at the time of inspection to save applicants from making extra trips where this presents a problem.

Costs

It is difficult to measure the total cost of FOI to the Queensland taxpayer, since such a calculation depends on the factors taken into account. Even where agencies have staff allocated to FOI activities, much of those officers' work time is spent on other tasks. The FOI Co-ordinator in Department of Business, Industry and Regional Development, for example, has been largely employed codifying policy and procedures. Another obstacle to quantifying costs is determining whether such activities as training represent costs alone or are assessable as benefits. Quantification of effectiveness benefits is another difficult issue. Other jurisdictions have generally provided cost data on the basis of costs directly attributable to processing applications.

Treasury provided a costs figure for its own FOI operations on this basis, multiplying hourly salary costs by the hours spent by staff at various levels processing applications. Using the salary rates provided by Treasury, and using only applications on which action was completed in the year to June 30, the total cost of FOI in Queensland was \$894,000. This equates to an

average of \$252 for each of the 3573 applications completed in the year.

The \$252 figure compares favourably with other jurisdictions. For example, the average cost per request in the Commonwealth (1991–92) is \$450, and in New South Wales (1989-90) \$422.19

Individual agencies vary considerably from the average in terms of cost per application. In general, policy agencies, such as Treasury and the Department of the Premier, Economic and Trade Development, have a higher processing cost because of the nature of applications received: complex non-personal requests requiring extensive documentary research and close examination of text. Law enforcement and social service agencies, such as the Police Service and the Department of Family Services, Aboriginal and Islander Affairs are also above average in terms of cost because of the requirement for extensive third party consultation. Straightforward service agencies, such as the Workers' Compensation Board, tend to be below average because of the simplicity and the number of applications received.

Some agencies received so few applications an average figure would be quite misleading. The North Queensland Electricity Board, for instance, received only one application; but it was of such complexity – requiring retrieval and examination of many documents up to thirty years old – it cost over \$5000 to process.

### 7: Operational difficulties

As part of the data collection exercise for this report, agencies were asked to comment on operational difficulties encountered since the Act came into effect.

Some agencies made little or no comment. Other agencies receiving relatively few FOI applications expressed great concern at the resource implications and perceived administrative shortcomings in FOI. Still other agencies with objectively more to be concerned about were relatively enthusiastic.

One agency, for example, was so concerned at resource implications it thought 'FOI is potentially unworkable unless liberal doses of funding and human resources are allocated to it'. Another agency, with an almost identical case load, reported 'no major operational difficulties have been experienced ... with respect to the administration of the Act.' It might be expected that market-oriented agencies would be more likely to voice disquiet at what might be seen as an additional burden, but there was in fact no necessary correlation of agencies' function and their attitude to FOI: some policy and regulatory agencies expressed grave concerns at resource implications, while some commercial agencies were entirely comfortable with the administrative load.

Collection of the data required for this report presented difficulties for the Department of Housing, Local Government and Planning. Unlike other centrally co-ordinated portfolios with large numbers of agencies, this Department had only a few weeks' operational experience in the reporting year for most of its agencies, namely the local government authorities. The independence of these authorities also presented the Department with difficulties in gaining information on applications. Accordingly, no data was provided by the Department in respect of some 42 local government authorities. Various options to improve the data reporting by local government authorities are being considered for 1993–94.

A number of agencies identified faults with the FOIDERS software package distributed by FOIALD, especially concerning flexibility in recording details of withdrawn applications and internal reviews, and the fragility of early release versions of the package. Several also commented favourably on later releases. User comments will be used in future upgrades of the software.

Document retrieval was listed as a problem by several agencies, most notably those with decentralised administrative structures or where amalgamations and transfers of functions had occurred in the recent past. DEVETIR and Department of Tourism, Sport and Racing both reported significant problems in the area of document retrieval. Department of Education found that record retrieval presented difficulties in meeting time limits imposed by the Act. The Department of the Premier, Economic and Trade Development reported its document retrieval system was working well and improving. The Department of Primary Industries reported its system had experienced some problems but was expected to improve with the introduction of new systems.


Several agencies noted that the resource impact of personal affairs applications would be reduced if applicants had a financial incentive to view the documents under supervision rather than requesting photocopies. No charges can be demanded for photocopies in a personal affairs application. Department of Health and the University of Queensland in particular noted that photocopying costs may be significant for these applications. Many applicants only require copies of a few documents from the range covered by their application. In some cases these records may contain over one thousand documents.

Photocopying charges in some cases were reported to be too small to merit collection, in that the processing costs involved in collecting the charges were greater than the amount recovered. The Department of Health in particular commented that a discretion to waive charges in such cases would be a welcome addition to the Act. A discretion to waive application fees and photocopying charges in financial hardship cases was also requested by Department of Health.

The time limits imposed by the Act were too short according to some agencies, especially for internal review applications and complex cases involving extensive third party consultations. The Department of Family Services and Aboriginal and Islander Affairs noted that many of its third party consultations were time consuming because applicants and third parties could be in dispute in, for example, the Family Court. Third parties may also be difficult to locate and may hold deep antipathy for an applicant. The Ombudsman raised the issue of time limits being a concern where the same documents were being sought by different applicants.


Chart 7.1 shows response times to complete action on applications. Most agencies are responding to applications within specified time limits. The

agencies most commonly exceeding the maximum available time limit of 75 days (allowing for consultation and time to apply for review) are the Corrective Services Commission, Department of Family Services and Aboriginal and Islander Affairs and the Queensland Police Service. In all three cases agencies have reported difficulties contacting third parties and obtaining their views on release of documents. Given the sensitivity of information held and the often strong views of third parties, this is to a certain extent to be expected. Chart 7.2 shows the altered position for average response times when these three agencies are removed from the calculation.


Chart 7.2 Response times: all agencies less Corrective Services, Dept Family Services, & Police



The agencies reporting greatest difficulty in meeting prescribed response times tend to have complex applications involving many documents, considerable third party consultation and a significant number of exemptions. Chart 7.3 shows the top ten agencies by numbers of documents processed.

Frivolous applications were reported by the Queensland Police Service and Department of Primary Industries. The latter agency reported one instance where a journalist sought access to submissions in a major industry review. Processing this request involved the Department in considerable effort, requiring extensive third party consultation and internal review of some decisions involving third party objections. At the completion of processing, the applicant failed to take advantage of the access provided. The Police Service advises some applicants have made similar repetitive requests apparently vexatiously and with no intention to discover information.

### 8: Difficulties in administration of the Act

### Interpretational difficulties

The definition of 'the public interest' presented difficulties for some agencies, notably the Queensland Police Service, Griffith University, the Department of Housing, Local Government and Planning, and the Department of Tourism, Sport and Racing. The Police and the Department of Tourism, Sport and Racing suggested a comprehensive checklist be provided covering all possible circumstances. A similar definitional problem was reported with 'legal professional privilege' by the Department of Tourism, Sport and Racing.

The Health Department found interpretational inconsistency created difficulties where an application affected several of its regional health authorities (RHAs). Since RHAs are entirely independent agencies, processing on such applications was undertaken individually and sometimes led to inconsistent decisions on similar documents.

The term 'personal affairs' appears to be differently interpreted by different agencies. Lack of provision in the Act to waive fees and charges in financial hardship cases for non-personal requests appears to have led some agencies to interpret 'personal affairs' generously. Other agencies with a more user-pays approach toward applicants appear to interpret the phrase very narrowly indeed. Applications for internal review based on decisions to impose fees are reported in several agencies, notably the Police Service and the Department of Transport. In many cases, applicants mistakenly believe that because a matter is of concern to them it must fall into the category of 'personal affairs'. Interpretation of 'personal affairs' only seems to be a problem as far as fees and charges are concerned, however. No agencies report difficulties in interpreting the phrase when it appears as the basis for an access exemption in section 44 (Matter concerning personal affairs).

The exemption in section 41(1) (Matter relating to deliberative process) was the subject of scrutiny by the Information Commissioner in his decision on *Eccleston and the Department of Family Services and Aboriginal and Islander Affairs*. He commented that the deliberative process exemption can be difficult for agencies to interpret.<sup>20</sup>

An examination of the statistical tables shows a number of apparently anomalous rates of use of section 41(1). The Department of Primary Industries statistics of provisions invoked (Appendix D) shows 3871 occasions on which the provision was used. Most of these related, apparently, to a single application where both 41(1) and 36(1) (Cabinet matter) provisions were cited to exempt material. That application is the subject of an external review which has not yet been resolved at the time of writing. The Corrective Services Commission reports section 41(1) as its most-used exemption at 1196 times. The Commission appears to have cited this exemption for psychiatric and behavioural reports which, since the Information Commissioner's decision, are now being correctly

exempted under section 44(3) (Matter affecting personal affairs), section 42(1) (Matter affecting law enforcement and public safety) and other provisions. In both these examples, the material in question would still be exempted by the agencies concerned, but different provisions would now be invoked in justification of their decisions.

In the main, use of exemptions by agencies corresponds with expectations based on their functions and the type of information they collect. Administrative Services Department, for example, makes relatively extensive use of section 45 ((Matter relating to trade secrets, business affairs and research) exemptions, and relatively infrequent use of section 44 (Matter relating to personal affairs). Section 44, by contrast, is the exemption most frequently cited by the Department of Family Services, Aboriginal and Islander Affairs. Similarly, it comes as no surprise that the Police Service makes relatively extensive use of the section 42 (matter relating to law enforcement and public safety) exemption.

Some agencies interpreted 'document' to mean the entire contents of a report or file. While this misinterpretation meant little in terms of access decision-making and processing, it does appear anomalous in the statistics where processing time and photocopying charges do not appear to match document numbers. In the main this interpretation seems to have '- surfaced in small professional registration or industry-related agencies, such as the Sugar Experiment Stations Board.

### Other difficulties

The Administrative Services Department encountered some difficulties in handling complex applications where the information sought needed to be sourced from several agencies. The Department has adopted the practice of partially transferring the request while processing that part of the application which refers to the Department, but has found some agencies are unwilling to accept a transfer on this basis. The Act does not provide for partial transfer.

Statements of reasons for decisions under section 34 of the Act were inconsistent in quality, particularly early in the year and among agencies receiving few applications. Following discussions between the Office of the Information Commissioner and FOIALD, comments and guidelines were circulated through the FOI Co-ordinators' network. Subsequent to this action the quality of statements of reasons issued to applicants has improved.

### 9: Local Government

The Act came into effect for local government authorities and Aboriginal and Islander councils on 19 May 1993, meaning that this Report can only examine some six weeks of operation.

FOIALD administered training programs for local government and Aboriginal and Islander councils in the months leading up to the date of effect. These were attended by representatives of all local government authorities in Queensland. A special local government edition of the FOI Policy and Procedures Manual was produced and distributed in March 1993.

The success of FOI for all other State agencies seems to have contributed to a rush on some local government authorities in the first weeks of the Act's operation. Appendix M shows types of applications received by local government authorities. Areas of high economic and population growth have clearly attracted the most interest in terms of numbers of applications. The top six, namely Brisbane City Council, Gold Coast City Council, Mulgrave Shire Council, Albert Shire Council, Logan City Council and Caloundra City Council together account for more than half the 168 applications received by all authorities put together.

A number of local authorities, in anticipation of likely applications, put in place both user-pays and free administrative access schemes for certain classes of information, such as building approval histories. This is provided for in section 22, which allows agencies to refuse access under FOI to documents reasonably available by other means

Only Mulgrave Shire Council, of the reports received, notified any operational difficulties. Mulgrave Shire expressed concern at the resources required to process applications and supervise inspection and suggested a regime of full user-pays and cost recovery.

In administering the Act, Mulgrave Shire also had some difficulty with the application of section 28 (Access may be refused in certain cases). The particular concern related to section 28(2) allowing agencies to refuse to deal with applications which would 'substantially or unreasonably divert the resources of the agency from their use by the agency in the performance of its functions'. Whereas the section confines the factors to which agencies may have regard in making a determination to refuse to deal with an application 'only to the number and volume of the documents and any difficulty that would exist in identifying, locating or collating the documents within the filing system of the agency', Mulgrave Shire would like to consider other factors, such as the difficulty in perusing the documents to determine exemptions.

Note that data for 42 authorities has not been received from Department of Housing, Local Government and Planning. A list of these authorities appears in 'Note on Statistical Data'.

### Note on Statistical Data

The data in the following tables was supplied by agencies. Care has been taken to confirm data and to double-check any anomalies.

In this, the first year of operation of complex administrative legislation, some errors were bound to occur and the statistical tables reflect this. For example, some agencies which received few applications were unaware that a 'document' is regarded as a page in a file or report, and instead listed the whole file or report as one document.

### Action — provisions invoked

The listing of exemption provisions invoked is based on the following rules:

- one document = one page;
- no provision is listed as having been invoked more than once for one document;
- different provisions may, however, be invoked in regard to the one document; therefore
- the number of times any one provision is invoked may not be more than the total number of documents released in part or refused, but the total number of provisions invoked may be more than this total.

Refusals under section 35 are sorted by exemption provision, but do not correspond to any number of documents, since this is a decision neither to confirm nor deny the existence of documents.

### Local government

The Act came into effect for local government authorities and Aboriginal and Islander councils on 19 May 1993. The local government reports thus cover only six weeks of operation. No data was received for some 42 local authorities, listed below. No applications were received by any Aboriginal or Islander council in this period.

Because the statistical pool is so small in regard to local authorities, some analytical tables which were provided for State agencies have been omitted in respect of local authorities.
